Weave with Me, Michelle Driver



Michelle Driver is a tapestry artist whose work inhabits the shadowy intersection of gothic aesthetics and sinister storytelling. Infused with themes of queerness, neurodiversity, and personal experiences of childhood trauma, her creations evoke a darkly poetic narrative, laced with subtle humour and unapologetic individuality.

Winner of the 2016 Port Pirie Art Prize and a finalist in numerous exhibitions, Michelle's work defies easy categorization. Her pieces beckon viewers to uncover the allure hidden within the overlooked, discarded, or unsettling—inviting them to revel in the beauty of the unconventional.

Michelle's practice extends beyond the tapestry loom. She repurposes loom waste into resin skulls, reflecting her fascination with decay and renewal, alongside her handwoven accessories and soy candles available at Threefold Designs.

Her tapestry 'Warp / Weft' is currently featured in Radical Textiles at the Art Gallery of South Australia. Michelle's website is www.threefolddesigns.com.au

NEW! 8-Shaft Loom for Rent

Member **Katy Clements** has generously contributed her Ashford Katie loom for guild rentals. There is a \$200 security deposit and \$45/month rental fee. Katy is also offering a rent-to-buy option for \$850. The Katie has a 12" weaving width, 10 dent reed, 320 Texsolv heddles and a padded carry bag. The folded dimensions are 19"W x 11"D x 19"H and it weighs 14 lbs. Pick up is in downtown Brooklyn.

Lin Qiqing (pronounced Chi-Ching) is a former award-winning journalist from China who explores themes of human relationships, gender, immigration, and language through her distinctive figurative weaving, incorporating hand-spun paper yarn and paper collage. She holds a BA in journalism (2014) and an MFA in Textiles from Parsons School of Design (2023). She currently works as a teaching artist at Intertwine Arts, a non-profit that offers weaving

workshops for people with disabilities. She was a resident artist at Residency Unlimited (2024), Woodstock Byrdcliffe Guild (2024), and the Houston Center for Contemporary Craft (2023). Her works have been exhibited at the Brooklyn Artists Exhibition of Brooklyn Museum, All Street Gallery, Surface Design Association, and New York Textile Month.



movement. An updated 30th anniversary edition was published this month!







Japanese Paper Yarn: Using Washi and Kami-ito to Knit, Crochet, Weave, and More by Andra F. Stanton

Learn about paper yarn's rich versatility and enjoy photos of works by dozens of contemporary artists. With simple instructions, make your own paper yarn from a sheet of kozo paper. Try 12 inspiring projects, from beginner-friendly pulped paper weaving to a more-experienced-level knitted scarf





Weaving with Wire: Creating Woven Metal Fabric by Christine K. Miller


Weave with wire warp and fiber weft to produce metal fabric—an entirely new art material that can be used for jewelry, sculpture, basketry, and more. Using a four- or eight-harness loom intermediate- to advanced-level weavers can create a woven metal fabric that is strong, malleable, and sculptural.

Tapestry with Pulled Warp: Inspiration, Technique, and the Creative Process by Susan Iverson

Designed for adventurous weavers of all skill levels who love a new challenge, this is the first book on the intriguing pulled warp technique.

Used through the decades by a handful of weavers to create 3-D tapestries, and also to make flat tapestries that bend and curve, pulled warp helps weavers achieve exciting results.





Woven Optical Illusions: Pattern and Design from Four to 24 Shafts by Stacey Harvey-Brown and Katharina Kronig

Explore a variety of optical effects through the medium of weaving. Learn the basic principles behind the illusions and how to create the effects in selected weave structures to give a wide range of examples and possibilities. Projects are taken from concept through weave design and development to a woven result.

Antonio Santin began borrowing exquisite carpets and outlining patterning, afterwards adding his own coloration and more patterning, building up layers of paint. As his technical skills allowed for far more detail than is found on a sewn carpet, he began to invent the entire image. This has freed him to make paintings that are more beautiful and intricate, and above all, personal.
